Differentiating Instruction in the Classroom



OVERVIEW

Educators are challenged each day to respond to the increasing variety of student needs, backgrounds, and learning styles. Differentiated Instruction is a philosophy regarding teaching and learning. It is also a collection of strategies that help teachers better address and manage the variety of learning needs in the classroom. In this course, participants will become familiar with teaching strategies and tools targeted for learning styles and multiple intelligences and develop a lesson plan utilizing these methods.



GOALS

This online course will enable participants to:

1. Gain a concrete understanding of Differentiated Instruction
2. Learn the skills to successfully implement Differentiated Instruction in the classroom
3. Understand strategies to assess learning styles and multiple intelligences of students
4. Identify characteristics of Howard Gardner's multiple intelligences
5. Recognize attributes of various learning styles
6. Understand content, process, and product
7. Develop a standards-based lesson plan which incorporates Differentiated Instruction strategies for students' learning styles and multiple intelligences



FINAL PRODUCT

COURSE EXPECTATIONS

This workshop is divided into six one-week sessions (after an initial orientation week) which each include readings, activities, and an online discussion among workshop participants. Participants should expect to spend 4-5 hours per week in order to adequately complete the work.

Team products are not acceptable without prior, written approval and will only be approved if the product is worthy of the time and effort of multiple participants.</p>
